Good Government *Michael K. Cantwell*

In the aftermath of the bloodiest battle of America's first Civil War, the man considered one of our two greatest presidents spoke with his characteristic eloquence of his hope that America would "have a new birth of freedom – and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth." The words are as timely, and precious, today as they were then.

Abraham Lincoln founded the Republican Party, but it has been decades since Republicans evinced any interest in government, much less a government of, by, and for the people. We can actually date the transformation to January 20, 1981, when the man Bette Davis once called "little Ronnie Reagan" conned millions of Americans into believing that "Government is not the solution to the problem: government is the problem."

That depends on the governors, of course. "Republicans campaign on the theme that government is bad," as Al Franken once quipped, "and they can't wait to get elected and show just how bad it is." The most recent and horrifying example was Trump's grotesque mishandling of the pandemic, in which more than 400,000 Americans died of Covid-19 on his watch.

He ignored <u>warnings</u> from his own administration that the government was "underfunded, underprepared and uncoordinated for a life-ordeath battle with a virus for which no treatment existed"; he allowed the virus to proliferate by failing to organize national testing and tracing; he abandoned those on the front lines by failing to use the federal government to organize the production and distribution of personal protective equipment; he ignored and ridiculed scientists; and he undermined governors who sought to contain the virus with closures and mask mandates.

Anyone who doubts that Trump is responsible for tens if not <u>hundreds</u> <u>of thousands</u> of Americans dying needlessly must explain how it came to pass that America has accounted for 20% of global Covid deaths despite constituting only 4% of the world's population. We are the richest country on earth and yet lead the world in Covid deaths.

<u>Republicans Excel at Showing</u> <u>America How Bad Government</u> <u>Can Be</u>

Trump is the poster child, but "bad government" has been the hallmark of every Republican administration over the last four decades. To be fair, of course, it's hard to provide for or protect ordinary Americans when you don't see that as part of your job description.

The AIDS epidemic began in 1981, but it was 4 years before Reagan even uttered the word publicly. His press secretary joked about the "gay plague" and 89,343 people died on Reagan's watch.

George W. Bush launched a \$3trillion war based on lies that killed thousands of Americans and untold numbers of Iraqi civilians. He then bungled the response to Hurricane Katrina and let the banks run wild, causing ten million Americans to lose their homes and precipitating

what was then the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression. As a result of Donald Trump's colossal incompetence, today that is only the *second* worst economic crisis since the Great Depression.

Origami Peace Cranes are an international peace symbol in tribute to a young Japanese girl named Sadako. She was dying of Leukaemia from exposure to the Nuclear Bomb in Hiroshima. Sadako tried to fold 1,000 cranes to bring peace to the world.

This video is dedicated to Black Lives Matter as well as Monica Heron and Jack Lieberman who sadly passed away and were festival favourites.

"My husband Elliott Schwartz filmed all ten festivals with volunteer videographers and edited the enormous footage to make this extraordinary video experience." said Susan Berkowitz-Schwartz.

None cares an ounce about democracy or the good of the nation. They only crave power and will step all over each other to prove their worth to Trump voters as they explore their presidential ambitions. The idea that any of these despicable men could be president should scare all voters. Add to that Congressmen Gaetz, Mast, et al, and Florida may well be ground zero for the political fight for the country's survival.

CPAC, an annual conference for the right wing of the party, was frequently seen as a side show where anyone wishing to be viable for national office would appear and bow to the audience. CPAC, and the Republican party over which it has absolute control, engages in an open alliance with groups that until recently mainstream Republicans have kept at bay. expressed throughout The views CPAC. Congressional Republicans, and Republican officials in many states, are in sync with the far right. The Trumpist Republican party is no longer the conservative alternative to Democrats but has now been completely transformed into a crypto-fascist party akin to those in Europe and elsewhere.

They view Trump as their absolute leader. They espouse the type of authoritarianism we have fought throughout our country's history and which we defeated in World War II. For many Americans, this is hard to fathom. Could the Republican Party really have become a right-wing party committed to absolute power, against democracy, and focused on policies that truly threaten our future? It is hard to for them to accept this, but the facts demonstrate it is the case. Democrats must remain vigilant and through credible communications ensure Americans see the existential danger. Democrats must also carefully craft their own message and policy priorities so as to The stakes could not be higher. Losing elections now is no longer about which party controls the legislative agenda and whether our state or national government leans more liberal or more conservative. Every election now until and unless the Republican Party sheds its embrace of extremist groups and authoritarianism comes with a life-or-death impact. How Florida Republicans Are Killing Floridians

It's not rocket science. Simple logic suggests that people lacking health insurance are more likely to die prematurely . . . and unnecessarily. Because of the cost, the uninsured are likely to forgo regular checkups and doctor's visits, so conditions that might have been treatable become intractable by the time the patient arrives at an emergency room. Not surprisingly, empirical studies have supported the link between a lack of health insurance and an untimely death.

The Affordable Care Act (ACA) sought to reduce the number of uninsured Americans (and the attendant deaths) by expanding Medicaid to cover Americans too poor to purchase health insurance but earning too much to qualify for traditional Medicaid. The program began in 2014 and covered anyone earning up to 138% of the federal poverty rate.

Florida has the fourth highest rate of uninsured in the country, <u>behind</u> only Georgia, Oklahoma, and Texas. Republicans firmly control state government, and they have refused to expand Medicaid even though the federal government would foot 90% of the cost. If the legislature passed and Ron DeSantis signed a bill expanding Medicaid, some 800,000 of the 2.8 million Floridians lacking health insurance would be covered . . . and lives would be saved.

How many lives? Or, more trenchantly, what is the human cost of their continued refusal? A pre-ACA study conducted at Harvard Medical School at a time when 45 million Americans lacked health insurance estimated that 45,000 people died annually as a result. Applying that ratio suggests 800 Floridians are dying needlessly every year because of Republican inaction, a figure roughly in line with a 2019 study

For the first three years, the program was fully funded by the federal government, with its contribution gradually dropping to 90%, where it now stands. The ACA also included a stick to accompany the carrot – any state that refused to expand Medicaid would lose all federal funding for traditional Medicaid.

The U.S. Supreme Court upheld most parts of the ACA in 2014 but struck down Medicaid expansion as unconstitutionally coercive. States that chose to participate would still be reimbursed, but states that refused to participate could not be punished.

that <u>estimated</u> the failure to expand Medicaid in Florida had led to 2,776 deaths over the prior 4 years.

It seems that Florida Republicans are more interested in inventing nonexistent problems to draft laws that would reduce turnout from Democrats (SB 90) or in criminalizing the protected First Amendment activity of groups it disfavors (H.R. 1) than it is in protecting Floridians from dying prematurely. But Republicans have always put party before people.

created a middle class that was once the envy of the world. That changed when Reagan replaced FDR's New Deal with his own Raw Deal, and ordinary Americans have been suffering ever since.

Nearly 80 years after the Great Depression began, we almost fell into another, with 800,000 jobs being shed monthly when Bush left office. Within 10 months of Obama's inauguration, some 4 million jobs were lost. Despite the monolithic opposition of the same Republican Party responsible for the crisis, Obama added 11.5 million jobs during his two terms and averted another Great Depression. And now here we go again, with Joe Biden inheriting an economy that has lost 10 million jobs and a pandemic that has killed more than half a million Americans. The bill goes well beyond an economic stimulus, as it includes measures that will reduce income inequality and significantly cut child poverty.

Republican columnist David Brooks is already referring to Joe Biden as a "<u>transformational</u> <u>president</u> and the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 as "one of the most important pieces of legislation of our lifetimes." Michelle Goldberg has suggested that the malignant shadow cast by Ronald Reagan is finally dissipating, referring to Biden's as "<u>The First</u> <u>Post-Reagan Presidency</u>."

The Way Forward

This is only the beginning. There's so much more to accomplish for an administration already channeling FDR. Passing an Infrastructure/Green New Deal bill

There are signs that the pendulum is swinging back with Joe Biden in the White House, at least in terms of the public's desire for and appreciation of good government. Three-quarters of Americans support the recently passed American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, including 60% of Republicans.

"To Promote the General Welfare"

Democrats are the party most associated with programs that "Promote the General Welfare," one of the goals of government identified in the Preamble to our Constitution. They created Social Security, unemployment insurance, Medicare, Medicaid, and the Affordable Care Act. There was a time, however, when Republicans actually believed in and heeded the constitutional command.

Teddy Roosevelt established the Food and Drug Administration to protect Americans from unsafe food and used the government to break the power of monopolies that held consumers and rivals hostage.

Dwight D. Eisenhower and even Richard Nixon used government on behalf of the people. Ike built the interstate highway system and Nixon established the Environmental Protection Agency and signed the Occupational Safety and Health Act and the Clean Water and Clear Air Acts.

With Joe Biden in the White House and Democrats controlling Congress, there are signs the pendulum is swinging back, at least with respect to the public's desire for and appreciation of good government. Three-quarters of Americans support the American Rescue Act of 2021, including 60% of Republicans. is essential both as a jobs program and a matter of national security. The jobs created will pay part of the cost – call it "trickle-up economics." The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act signed by Obama proved that "trickle-up" actually works while simultaneously (and once again) exposing Reagan's "trickle-down" as a con game invented and espoused by professional liars for credulous fools.

Indeed, Trump's tax bill may have finally driven the stake through the lie that wouldn't die. Now even Joe Manchin is <u>talking</u> about repealing some of the tax cuts to the wealthy and increasing the corporate tax rate to help pay for the infrastructure bill.

Increasing IRS funding to pursue tax cheats and avoiders will pay for itself many times over. The IRS recently <u>reported</u> that nearly one million wealthy individuals had failed to file taxes over the prior three-year period, costing the government nearly \$46 billion in taxes. A recent <u>article</u> estimated that increasing the IRS budget by \$100 billion over the next 10 years would raise \$1.15 trillion.

So stay tuned. Republicans have not even paid lip service to good government in 40 years. The idea is so old (and venerable) that it's become new again, and JRB is going to run with it.

The Former Republican Party

The Republican Party was established in the 1850s when the Whig Party, in essence its predecessor, lost favor among voters over issues involving slavery. The original Republicans took a stronger position towards abolishing slavery and Abraham Lincoln took that message to the White House after the 1860 election as the first Republican president.

Now, approximately 160 years later, it is the Republican Party undergoing a tumultuous transformation. Will it go the way of the Whigs and be replaced by a successor party focused on traditional conservatism and/or center right ideology or will it survive in its new form as a right -wing party that embraces extremism and authoritarianism akin to similar parties in Europe and elsewhere.

Throughout our history there have been attempts at new or "third parties" to compete with the two established parties. The original Republicans were unique in that they rose quickly and eclipsed the Whigs into extinction, thus maintaining our Donald Trump was not the first to invite support of extremists, but he dramatically altered the party through his open embrace and total alliance with extremists including white supremacists, antigovernment militias, overt authoritarianism, etc.

Only with support from such groups could the Republicans even hope to maintain power as a party of predominantly White Americans. Race, and rejection of impending multiculturalism, became the hallmark of the modern Republican Party now completely shedding its political policy and ideology in favor of just holding power and all costs.

Over generations the Republican Party fluctuated between a center-right and traditional conservative party with fairly consistent and predictable policy platforms covering the full range of issues. They gave themselves the label of "Constitutional conservatives," which at least arguably indicated a commitment to democracy and the rule of law. That is a debate for another time, perhaps no longer

traditional two-party system. It is interesting to ponder what would have happened if both the Whigs and Republicans remained in addition to the Democrats and whether three viable parties could have survived. More recently we saw the rise and fall of the Reform Party in the 1990s, never really gaining traction as a viable national alternative to the Democrats and Republicans. The key to original Republican survival was likely the critical issue of slavery and desire of voters for a party committed to abolition and the Whigs floundering if not failing on that issue.

Ironically in the modern era race may again be the decisive factor in the demise or wholesale transformation of a major political party. While the Democratic Party recognized and seemingly embraced the rapidly changing demographic picture of the nation, understanding that the U.S. will not long remain a majority White country, the Republican Party openly rejected this inevitability. relevant. Republican leaders in Congress and many state governments embraced then President Trump's disdain for democracy, rejection of the rule of law, and open defiance of the Constitution and limits of executive authority. They did so knowing full well they were trading conservative ideology for extending political power, now without an ideology to guide it.

It was abundantly clear to anyone paying attention that Donald Trump lost the 2020 election. There was no rampant fraud that challenged in any way Joe Biden's victory. All of these Republican leaders knew it, but such truth was not controlling as they were more focused on maintaining power at any cost. The will of the people be damned, democracy now an inconvenience, the Constitution just an old piece of paper, the sole focus was keeping Trump in the White House and wielding unlimited power. There were unprecedented,

concerted, centralized efforts to disenfranchise communities of color so that these predictably Democratic votes would not be counted, and Trump would "win" the election. Due to the pandemic, and an inability to take the time to stand in long lines, etc., it was necessary for these communities of color to rely on the completely lawful option of voting by mail. For months Trump spread baseless conspiracy theories about voting by mail in preparation for his plan to try and have the ballots thrown out. There was no legitimate challenge to the ballots, just his knowledge that if they were properly counted, he would lose.

While there were Republican election officials in Georgia, Arizona, Pennsylvania, and elsewhere who did their sworn duty and counted all properly cast ballots, there were party leaders across the nation swarming to Trump's side as confederates in his disenfranchisement and election theft plot. Every one of them stood against democracy, against the rule of law, against the Constitution, and against the clear will of the American people. Every one of them chose authoritarianism over democracy. This conspiracy led directly to the insurrection against the Capitol on January 6, 2021, the last desperate attempt to undermine democracy and overturn a valid election by Trump's extremist hoard.

Despite the unprecedented, dangerous, and deadly attack just hours before, Trump's Congressional allies engaged in fraudulent, baseless objections to the Electoral College vote in a despicable and disingenuous display.

Why would Republican leaders participate in Trump's plot to steal the election and undermine democracy? Why have they embraced his antidemocratic rhetoric for the past four years? This is the transformation of the Republican Party, the old party of Lincoln and even Reagan, to the new Republican Party, no longer a center-right or conservative party. It is now solidly a right-wing party beholden to authoritarianism over democracy, embracing an alliance with extremist groups in rejection of freedom and the rule of law. They have little or no policy platform or ideology that guides them. They are about wielding power. Absolute power. Power unchecked by our Constitutional checks and balances. To learn more about this new party, examine the rise of similar right-wing parties in Europe. There are stark similarities.

excused every Trump transgression under the guise of placing right-wing ideologues on all levels of our judicial system. They planned for these judges to ignore the law and provide favorable rulings allowing them to violate the election, consolidate power, and wield absolute power in the future. Thankfully, this plan failed, at least in 2020, where judges denied Trump's bogus election claims. However, this does not end the crisis. These judges, with lifetime appointments, will rule on numerous cases of great importance concerning our government and our rights. If Trump was the practice run, what happens when there is a better planned and prepared effort to thwart democracy? What happens if our government finally understands the need to address the unlawful operations of the extremist groups, now fully integrated into the new **Republican Party?**

The 2022 and 2024 elections will be pivotal to our nation's future and the future of democracy, the rule of law, and our rights. Historically the party in power does poorly in the midterm election, meaning the Democrats have a real chance to lose control of the House and Senate in 2022. The new Republican Party is prepared to do what it takes to win those seats and then challenge for the White House in 2024. The American people must reject the new right- wing Republicans, voting against them in every election at every level going forward until and unless the party returns to its traditional role as a center right or mainstream conservative party. The right-wing party wielding power in Congress and state houses across the nation poses a clear threat to our future and our continuation as a democracy.

We cannot allow this great nation to be transformed into an authoritarian country with absolute rule by an infallible leader. Trump and his allies worked extremely hard and came way too close to succeeding in this effort and now we are armed with experience and knowledge of what is to come. As for the Democrats, they must provide viable options for the former Republican voters to ensure the new Republican Party cannot win local, state, and national campaigns. People in Idaho will not vote for a Massachusetts style liberal, but there are enough good people there who will reject right-wing authoritarianism if Democrats give them a good Idahoan alternative. Additionally. former mainstream Republicans who still respect democracy and the rule of law, must either regain control of their party or successfully establish its replacement, much like the Republicans did to the Whigs. Country first!

The End of Trickle-Down Economics? But within it, it was designed to begin a transformation. And what you talked about earlier, the number of people who are being lifted out of poverty, is absolutely essential. You know, the first act passed under the previous presidency, one of the few acts in the process of what is called reconciliation, was a tax bill in December 2017. And nothing — the difference couldn't be clearer. That was a tax bill that helped the billionaires and the corporations. The money went to the top. This is a transformation with the money going to the people who really need it.
