"We Must Sink or Swim Together"

As America was mired in our First Great Depression, the United States Supreme Court issued its opinion in *Baldwin v. G. A. F. Seelig, Inc.* The unanimous decision was written by Justice Benjamin Cardozo, one of the Twentieth Century's most eloquent and admired jurists.

The facts of the case and the rationale for the decision were both straightforward. In an effort to protect its dairy farmers from competition, New York passed a law setting a minimum price for milk sold in New York. By thus effectively imposing a tariff on milk imported from other states, the law interfered with interstate commerce, over which the U.S. Constitution granted Congress exclusive power.

New York's desire to protect its dairy farmers was insufficient to overcome the constitutional violation, and Justice Cardozo might have left it there. Instead he took the occasion to contrast the divisive philosophy underlying the New York statute with the cooperative philosophy underlying the Constitution. In words as timeless as they are now timely, he perfectly captured the essence of the grand experiment we began over 200 years ago:

To give entrance to that excuse would be to invite a speedy end of our national solidarity. The Constitution was framed under the dominion of a political philosophy less parochial in range. It was framed upon the theory that the peoples of the several states must sink or swim together, and that in the long run prosperity and salvation are in union and not division.

Today, as we face the twin threats of the greatest public health crisis in a century and the highest unemployment rate since the First Great Depression, America is led by the most divisive president in modern history. Any hope he would rise to the occasion has long been dispelled.

After weeks of minimizing, indeed ridiculing, the threat posed by the novel coronavirus, President Trump finally comprehended its magnitude. He declared a national emergency and immediately declined to take responsibility for the government's delay in producing and distributing test kits, an essential element in understanding and combatting the spread of the virus.

Register to Vote By Mail Now!

Even before the coronavirus pandemic the Florida Democratic Party encouraged all Democrats to vote by mail because it is convenient, it greatly increases turnout, and this year it is postage free in PBC.

Today it is no longer solely a matter of convenience. Milwaukee residents waited hours to vote recently because all but 5 of 180 polling stations were closed, and a number of voters <u>later tested positive</u> for Covid-19. Americans shouldn't have to risk their lives in order to exercise their constitutional right to vote.

Register online at <u>pbcelections.org</u> and follow the prompts or by phone 561-656-6208. Registering to vote by mail will not prevent you from going to the polls. It just gives you another option if you are unable to vote in person.

When governors of hard-hit states, mostly Democrats, begged for life-saving supplies such as ventilators, masks, and gowns, he mocked and insulted them. Treating them like contestants on The Apprentice (or Volodymyr Zelensky), he boasted that the level of federal support might depend upon how nice they were to him. In the midst of a pandemic that has claimed more than 75,000 Americans, this is not merely divisive – it is monstrous and unconscionable.

Treating the governors like contestants on The Apprentice (or Volodymyr Zelensky), he boasted that the level of federal support might depend upon how nice they were to him.

He delayed for weeks before invoking the Defense Production Act to order production of critical supplies, falsely claiming the Act was rarely used and was tantamount to nationalizing a company. He finally invoked the Act with his trademark combination of bile and lies, blaming General Motor for moving too slowly on a contract for ventilators when in fact the Trump administration was the cause of the delay.

Trump's suggestion that states seek ventilators and masks on the open market led to chaos as states bid against one another, driving up prices, only to be outbid by the federal government. When states managed to purchase equipment, it was subject to delays and even confiscation by the federal government.

For example, 3 million N95 masks ordered by Massachusetts <u>were confiscated</u> in Port of New York and added to the federal stockpile. That seizure <u>was cited</u> by Republican Governor Larry Hogan of Maryland as the reason he arranged for the 500,000 coronavirus test kits he ordered from South Korea to be flown into BWI Airport in Maryland, rather than Dulles International Airport in Virginia. The Maryland National Guard and State Police met the plane and guarded the kits as the shipment was transported to an undisclosed location.

Perhaps the most divisive issue facing the nation today is when and how to lift the restrictions that have helped slow the spread of the virus. It pits people whose livelihoods depend upon reopening the economy against those whose lives depend upon keeping it closed until the curve of the disease has been flattened.

Once again, Trump has opted for division. He undermines governors by applauding Astroturf protests demanding that states (mostly Blue states) "reopen" their economies. He threatens that he might hold back support for states if governors don't abide by his request to open up their economies by relaxing stay-at-home rules: "They'll need, maybe, equipment that we have. We have a tremendous stockpile that we're in the process of completing. We're in a very good position."

No, Mr. President, "we" are not in a very good position. We are in the midst of the greatest public health crisis in a century and the greatest economic collapse since the Great Depression and you are making things much worse.

We are not swimming together, we are not even sinking together – we are sinking separately.

Seasonal Resident? Vote here!

Voters living in a deep blue state, such as New York, can register to vote in Florida where your vote will help decide critical elections. You must:

- 1. Be a Citizen of the United States of America
- 2. Be a Florida resident;
- 3. Be at least 18 years old;
- 4. Not have been adjudicated mentally incapacitated with respect to voting in Florida or any other state without having the right to vote restored;
- 5. Not have been convicted of a felony without your voting rights having been restored.

Being a Florida resident isn't defined in law but over time courts and the Florida Department of State and Division of Elections have construed residency to be where a person mentally intends to make his or her permanent residence. So even if you spend more time in another place, if you intend for Florida to be your permanent residence, you can register to vote.

Evidence of such intent can come from items or activities such as obtaining a Florida driver's license, paying tax receipts, paying bills for residency (light, water, garbage service) and receiving mail at an address, claiming the property as homestead, declaring the county as domicile, and doing other activities indicative or normally associated with home life

There may be repercussions in the other state, such as not being allowed to take the STAR exemption in New York if you take the Homestead in Florida, so make sure to check, but if you plan to make Florida your home, you can vote here.

Of course, you can only vote in one place.

Insurrection Is not a Constitutional Right

Recently government officials in states across the nation have faced angry protests demanding an end to the "stay at home" orders issued to protect the public's health. The First Amendment guarantees these individuals a right to express themselves and their viewpoints, but it does not permit them to incite "imminent lawless action." The Second Amendment, even under Justice Scalia's strained reading in *Heller*, guarantees neither the right for Americans to own military assault rifles nor for armed mobs to threaten imminent lawless action.

Many protesters openly, and menacingly, carry military assault weapons including AK-47s. Why are state officials tolerating unruly mobs that cross from peaceful protest into threatening armed insurrection? In some cases, that is exactly what these become.

extremely deadly pandemic. This has nothing more to do with freedom than sexual assault has to do with wanting to make love.

Trump crossed yet another line, inexplicably supporting armed insurrections against elected leaders in several states when these leaders were just following the guidelines announced by his own administration concerning pandemic response and social distancing. Reprehensibly, Trump openly supported armed insurrections against state governments operating within the legal framework established in their constitutions. His conduct ran contrary to the standards expected of any U.S. President or government leader at any level. Whatever policy differences and debates exist, there is no political controversy serious enough to justify any support whatsoever for vio-

For example, in Michigan, an armed mob violently forced their way through the perimeter of the state legislature and into the hallways outside the chamber where legislators were meeting. Although law enforcement prevented them from breaking into the chamber, these protesters were clearly inciting imminent violence against legislators. In fact, lawmakers were given bulletproof vests to wear because of the threat. The Constitution does not protect, and civilized society condemns, such behavior. Law enforcement should have used force to repel the mob back to an approved demonstration area, and arrest them if they refused. One imagines that is what would have happened to armed mobs of minorities or left-wing protesters.

To be fair, most gun owners do not bring their firearms to protests and disagree with this approach of the armed mobs. In fact, these mobs represent at best 10% of the country, at least as far as the extremist views they present. Unfortunately, President Trump offered them ill-advised and extremely inappropriate support, texting the word "liberate" along with several of the states. Liberate is not a message of peaceful protest concerning government policies. It is a call to rid the citizenry of a foreign invader or tyrant. Duly elected state leaders, regardless of party or policy, are nothing close to a foreign invader or tyrant, no matter how much we may argue over their policies. This was not at all an issue of freedom, but rather the extent of societal obligations during an


lence or armed insurrection. We enjoy a rich tradition of political discourse, but we never condone criminal violence of any nature.

While Republican Governor DeWine of Ohio imposed some of the strictest restrictions and faced his own protests, Trump deliberately omitted Ohio from his list of states to liberate. Trump was clearly, reprehensibly using the pandemic and the deep fears of various communities, as a wedge issue to foment further discord across the country. This at a time when we need the country to come together as rarely before. His goal was another attempt to deflect or distract attention from his own failures and shortcomings. However, by openly encouraging the armed mobs he increased the risk of violence. This should be intolerable to all Americans, even those who may sympathize with some of the views expressed in the protests.

These individuals are criminals, not protestors. They are terrorists, not patriots. They are armed insurgents actually threatening our democracy, not fighting for freedom. If you choose to brandish military assault weapons at your rally, you are not engaging in protected political protest. You are threatening society and democracy. You tacitly admit your views lack the legitimacy to join the public debate over the respective policy. To state it bluntly, you show your complete ignorance and delegitimize any argument you wish to offer.

"If you don't vote, you don't count"

That was the creed and the epitaph of Vernon Ferdinard Dahmer, Sr., president of the Hattiesburg, Mississippi, NAACP, who was murdered by the Ku Klux Klan. If you don't vote, you dishonor his grave and the graves of the thousands who have died fighting for the franchise. Get registered if you're not already, make sure your friends are registered, and get out and get them out to vote. And register to vote by mail.
