The Devil's Enterprise at Christmas

The United States media are always at pains to tell us that Christmas is the time of year to think about the beauty of giving, of peace and good will, the joy of being with family, and our great good fortune to live in a land where decency and blessings prevail.

Now, however, the truth is that we find ourselves called upon to accept the outrageous depravity tenanting the White House and spewing animosity and violence on a daily basis. Racial virulence is one aspect of the president's demeanor as we heard when he described the "shithole" nations of Africa, Latin America, and the Caribbean where dark-skinned populations reside.

Yet, race is not the only card he is playing in his plans to reduce the number of immigrants seeking entry to the US. The <u>Los Angeles Times</u> notes that Trump and his immigration advisers (such as Stephen Miller) have designed his policy to limit admissions to only those wealthy enough to buy their own health insurance within 30 days of arrival.

The fact is that lawful permanent residents cannot receive Medicaid <u>for their first five years</u> in the United States. And the Affordable Care Act makes its subsidies available only to <u>noncitizens lawfully present</u>. "But the new policy would make someone ineligible to immigrate if they need such help, setting an unduly high financial hurdle."

This edict was effectively intercepted by an Oregon District Court Judge, Michael Simon, who issued an injunction that is awaiting a legal challenge. Judge Simon therefore concluded that Trump's policy would have "significantly altered the nature of immigration by effectively barring poor people." He added that the President's rule was surely in conflict with the Immigration and Naturalization Act. Moreover, the President offers no national security or foreign relations at all as justification for this sweeping change in immigration law."

The legal immigration system is further under attack by the White House, aiming at family unification – its desire being to hugely expand enforcement efforts and reduce protections for asylum seekers and unaccompanied child migrants. Such major changes are an unbalanced arrangement to enact hardline and wrongful regenerate schemes. It has been shocking and sadly observed that child migrants have been illegally removed from their parents, thus creating an "unaccompanied" status, and confined in detention centers that are little more than prisons.

So, here we are my fellow citizens – in a new year and facing another continuing blow to democracy and – to use a term in rare use these days, civic virtue. We need to remember that except for Native Americans, every one of us is/was an immigrant.

Many would have us believe that our human civilization is uniquely predetermined and invariant – that is, we have now achieved a state of grace; that where we are and how we live at this moment (particularly true of Americans), can be attributed to only two components – those who are natives and those who are migrants, with migrants being the outliers But this is not true. As an article in the National Geographic explains, however, the reality is that all "Humans are a migratory species." If we are fixed at this moment, be assured that the change in climate alone will bring about alien and distressing migrations.

Biased, narrow opinions are retrograde in their social postures and those who hold them look longingly at eras of white supremacy when accessibility to privilege and homogeneity ruled. These opinions are far more destructive and inapposite. "The idea that we can return to a simpler, better, and non-contentious past is an imaginary construct and an impossibility." The future will prove this belief impermissible.

They will not watch the hearings or read about them and thus are extremely susceptible to whatever farfetched machinations Trump spins. The fact that the polls did not move after the hearings and the country remains evenly split on impeachment ratifies this despicable approach.

They asserted that Trump was merely focused on anti-corruption efforts. The evidence is much to the contrary. The State Department, Intelligence Community, and Department of Defense had all reviewed the Ukrainian arms sale and officially certified that Ukraine had taken the proper steps against corruption. Trump removed a highly effective and respected ambassador, Marie Yovanovich, who was a committed anti-corruption champion, solely because she would

not support HIS corruption. In almost 3 years in office, Trump has not shown any interest whatsoever in corruption anywhere in the world, including his own administration, yet he wants people to believe that in this once instance that was his only concern.

Republicans baselessly accuse Democrats of an unfair process, but the reality is that the process was established and enacted by the Republican majority led by then-Speaker John Boehner. Republicans falsely claim the White House did not have the opportunity to participate or to challenge the evidence. They most certainly did. However, the administration has chosen to obstruct and distort, intimidate witnesses, issue false statements, refuse to comply with subpoenas, and prevent witnesses from testifying or turning over President Trump, Secretary Pompeo, documents. Chief of Staff Mulvaney, and other leaders all refused to testify. Republicans claimed the case was all hearsay with no primary witnesses. They cannot properly make that claim when they are withholding evidence and preventing the primary witnesses from participating. Republicans put on a fallacious display to gain access to the depositions, falsely claiming they were not allowed into the hearing. The truth is that the committees that conducted the depositions were the standing committees on which they had full membership, all members had the ability to attend, and most Republicans fully participated.

The truth is clear and the facts incontrovertible. Anyone paying attention knows what Trump did and believe it to be wrong. The focus is on what should happen. Now that the House has impeached Trump, the Senate must determine what sanction to impose. Republicans want the country to acquiesce around the reality that we have a corrupt president and this is just how Trump does things. "Get over it..." Democrats Fight for Ordinary Americans

For over a century, Democrats have fought for ordinary Americans. With little or no help from Republicans, we've developed programs on which Americans now depend:

- Medicare, Medicaid, and President Obama's Affordable Care Act ("ACA")
- Social Security, Unemployment Insurance, Minimum Wage and 40-hour workweek

Republicans Fight for Billionaires Against Ordinary Americans

The Republican "tax cut" rewards plutocrats and punishes ordinary Americans:

- The top 0.1% (people with income over \$1.5 million) receive 60% of the benefits. The top 1% of taxpayers receive over 80% of the benefits.
- If your income is under \$75,000, you'll get a tax INCREASE over the ten-year life of the bill.

Republicans will raid Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid to pay for the 'tax cut":

- The "tax cut" will <u>increase the deficit</u> by \$1.9 trillion over ten years.
- Trump calls for \$1.9 trillion in cuts to Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid.

Republican attacks on affordable health insurance cause premature, unnecessary deaths:

- Republicans eliminated the ACA's "individual mandate," causing insurance costs to jump.
- More than three million Americans lost health insurance in Trump's first year in office, jumping to four million in 2018 and projected to reach 13 million by 2027.
- Ron DeSantis refuses federal funds that would insure 840,000 Floridians through the ACA.
- The "uninsured" face a <u>25%-40% increased risk</u> of dying prematurely. One pre-ACA study estimated that lack of insurance was responsible for <u>45,000 deaths every year</u>. Do the math; people are dying from Republican greed.

Republicans are poisoning Americans and destroying the environment:

- Former EPA Chief and climate denier Scott Pruitt suppressed a study that found an alarming level of chemicals in America's drinking water that can cause birth defects, kidney cancer, and thyroid diseases.
- Trump rolled back or announced plans to <u>roll back 83 environmental regulations</u> involving air and water pollution, drilling and extraction, toxic substances, and animal protection.
- After lobbying by the chemical industry, the EPA will not look at air, water or ground contaminants when determining the health and safety risks of potentially toxic chemicals.

Pensacola was Preventable

It all relates back to a flawed relationship between the U.S. and Saudis.

The Saudi leadership is wholly complicit and shame on our senior leaders who continue to see them as reliable friends and partners. Remember, the Saudis never accounted for how all but one of the 9/11 terrorists were Saudi Arabian and our government

has unfathomably protected them ever since. More recently, the Saudis have not accounted for their torture-murder of journalist Jamaal Khashoggi. President Trump bears some responsibility. close ties with the Saudi royal family led to misplaced trust in them and increased involvement. The NRA bears some responsibility. The shooter legally purchased his weapon in Florida. The NRA opposes restricting even those on the terror watch list from purchasing weapons. Maybe a reasonable background check could have red-flagged this purchase, but the NRA opposes those as well.

The amazing, dedicated professionals at Pensacola will continue their great work. They should never again have to fear an enemy in their ranks. If any good comes from this tragedy, it is the hope that we improve the selection, vetting, and admittance process for foreign military members.

Is the Economy That Good?

- "Despite several seemingly pro-business policies . . . the first career-businessman President has become bad for business."
- "The fear among many businesspeople is that...he's doing more harm than good."
- "Today, shares of all America's major steelmakers are trading below where they were before Trump's election," despite his <u>promises</u> to bring the steel industry back.
- *Trickle down?* "The Congressional Research Service found no indication of a surge in wages in 2018 either compared to history or relative to GDP growth." Instead, corporations have spent much of their increased spending power to buy back stock, to the tune of over a trillion dollars.
- "The stock market boom has evaporated...adjusted for inflation [since January 2018], the gain is less than 2%."
- Anticipated GDP growth for next year is just 2% -- "in line with growth since 2000, which has averaged 2.1%."
- "Trump's highest-profile policy prescriptions, reducing trade and immigration, have long been opposed by economists across the political spectrum."
- Immigration reform? Deportations are down (276,000/yr.) compared to Obama's 383,000/yr. But legal immigration is down sharply (200,000 last year vs. over a million in 2014), which "is bad news for American business and industry...America's technology sector is unimaginable without immigrants... 71% of tech employees in Silicon Valley are foreign-born."
- "The Congressional Budget Office forecasts...trillion-dollar annual deficits for at least the next decade... [assuming] no recession," thanks to the **don't-tax-but-spend-anyway** Republicans.

So when your friends and neighbors rave about how good Trump has made our economy, <u>you can set them straight</u>. More than the buffoon we may think he is, Donald Trump is <u>bad for America</u>, plain and simple. Spread the word. *Help make the blue sun shine on the Sunshine State*.
