Republicans don't like it when every citizen has an opportunity to vote. It's called "democracy" but spells "defeat" for Republicans.

That's why, after Joe Biden's landslide victory and the narrow wins by Rev. Raphael Warnock and Jon Ossoff in Georgia, Republicancontrolled states immediately set to work enacting highly restrictive voting laws.

This exacerbated the already tenuous protection for voting rights following the Supreme Court decision in Shelby County v. Holder that gutted the heart of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 by holding its "preclearance" provisions to be unconstitutional. No longer would states with discriminatory practices be required to submit any proposed changes in their laws to the Department of Justice

In response to the explosion of discriminatory laws, the House passed the Freedom to Vote Act and the John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act, both now pending in the Senate and arguably the most important legislation introduced by the Biden administration. The Freedom to Vote Act would
