Rabbi Barry Silver, Esq.

"His life was gentle; and the elements So mixed in him, that Nature might stand up And say to all the world, this was a man!"

Barry was not merely what Shakespeare called a "man." He was a mensch, a complete human being - a devoted father and husband, a fierce advocate for the vulnerable and downtrodden, and an inspirational religious leader and co-founder of "Cosmic Judaism." The elements were mixed in him, although he was not gentle with those who abused their positions of trust or took advantage of the defenseless.

In this issue, dedicated to Barry, we – friends, colleagues, followers, and all of us who were touched and inspired by Barry – remember and celebrate this remarkable human being.

I first met Barry in the summer of 2018, shortly after Donald Trump's Orwellian-titled American Healthcare Act cleared the House. I joined a large crowd rallying in front of the courthouse in downtown Delray Beach to protest a law that stripped millions of insurance and condemned thousands to premature, preventable deaths. Barry was one of the speakers.

After the rally a group of us were sitting around and talking, and I learned that Barry had conceived the rally only days earlier, along with a few others, including Geoff Kashdan and Mark Schneider. I found it remarkable that he was able to attract such a sizable crowd in such short order.

I'm honored that Barry was a follower of and frequent contributor to *The Delray Democrat* as well as a member of the Democratic Club of Delray Beach for many years. The last time I saw Barry was when he asked for "a minute" to speak at a Club meeting last October.

He wanted to speak about the preliminary vote by the Palm Beach County Commission to open up the Ag Reserve to developers. Two Democrats were in the 4-3 majority voting in favor, and a follow-up hearing was scheduled the next week.

Barry spoke for far longer than a minute, and he was on fire, not only passionately condemning the betrayal of a promise to keep developers out of the last undeveloped part of Palm Beach County but also talking about Cosmic Judaism. You could tell that physically he was not doing well, but he was inspired by a holy spirit.

The next day he circulated an email call-to-arms and Mindy Koch, the chair of the Democratic Executive Committee of Palm Beach County, issued a plea for people to attend the hearing and speak out against the land swap. You can hear Barry speak out at Commission meetings here and at 4:16:10 here (urging the commissioners to "listen to the horses say 'nay""). His voice and passion played a major role in the decision by the two Democrats on the Commission to change their votes.

Barry was also a tireless supporter of Ukraine following Putin's invasion, and that leads to perhaps the sweetest collaboration with Barry, who had spearheaded a rally in Veterans Park in downtown Delray. Our Club had simultaneously scheduled a sign waving in support of Ukraine at the "Peace Corner" (Atlantic and Swinton Avenues), and Barry asked us to join his rally.

After waving signs we silently marched along Atlantic Avenue with our signs and were cheered and even given standing ovations from diners as we made our way to (and later back from) the Pavilion in Veterans' Park. In over 60 years of marching and protesting, I have never received a reception like that. None of us had.

The memory of Barry is a blessing. It is also a call to us all that we can and should be doing more.

My Teacher, the Rabbi-Rouser

Many years ago, I participated in a fund-raising 25-mile bike event. The bike I had was old but with multi-speed settings, so I thought it to be a more than O.K. Oh! Was I wrong! As the ride progressed, I was surprised when so many others seemed to effortlessly pass me. The "so many others" included four-year-olds on trikes and even a zombie on a pogo stick. Not only did I learn humility, but I was inspired to get a new and lighter bike and then try again.

That was a metaphor for my personal experience in activism with Barry Silver. I had considered myself a fighter for the separation of church and state since my ninth-grade protest against a religious Christmas event at my public high school. In my adulthood, I wanted to start a PBC chapter of Americans United for the Separation of Church and State (Americans United). When I contacted the Americans United office, I was advised to reach out to someone called Barry Silver who also expressed such an interest in my area. I had already seen Barry when he was the featured speaker at Center for Inquiry event in Broward County. So, I knew what he looked like and, when our paths crossed at a Delray Art Festival, I introduced myself. That is where it began.

Over the years, Barry got me involved with a plethora of causes and events. He always sought to include others and I was part of the "others." We worked together to create a progressive "umbrella" organization which he called the Justice League. He asked me to participate in a lawsuit he launched against the PBC School District for its failure to teach the science of evolution to middle school children . . . and to use the term, "evolution" instead of "gradual change over time."

Barry was an activist in the fight for common sense gun regulation and always made a "space" at his rallies to comment on gun carnage and reforms needed. Barry organized, with Michael Cantwell (editor of *The Delray Democrat* newsletter), a public gathering supporting the people of the Ukraine. He argued against the selling of farmland in the Ag. Reserves at a Palm Beach County Commission meeting. And he filed suit to prove that the bans on abortion rights were an example of the intrusion of one religious perspective on others, regardless of their religious affiliations or non-affiliations. He had so many issues, so many projects and so many concerns.

So, let me now connect the dots. What relationship does the story about the 25-mile bike ride have with the story of my involvement with Rabbi Barry Silver. The analogy is that while I considered myself a respectable bike rider and learned that I had much to achieve in that realm, I also considered myself a respectable progressive activist and learned from Barry that I had much to achieve in the realm as well. Barry was so amazingly informed, so eloquent a speaker, so linguistically talented that I felt honored (and, to be honest, surprised) that he included me in his circle of friends. He officiated at my daughter's wedding and I gave Power Point presentations to his temple. Now I look forward to reading his book, Cosmic Judaism, and learn more about this amazing and inspirational man. He still has so much to teach and I look forward to learning from him. I miss him already!

Remembering Barry Silver

I first met Barry Silver in early 1989 when I joined the local NOW chapter. My printing business began preparing the newsletters for the South Palm Beach County Chapter of NOW (National Organization for Women). And here we are, 34 years later still working with NOW and other feminists for human rights for all, especially women's rights.



If ever there was someone deserving of NOW's Feminist of the Year 2023 award, it was Rabbi Barry Silver. He had the courage, patience, and tenacity to take on important battles and to work in coalition with other individuals and groups.

In the spring of 1989, Operation Rescue (O.R.) came to Boca Raton with over 600 people to obstruct and blockade the entrance to the clinic of Dr. Robert Livingston. They blocked patients from entering the clinic because he performed abortions, *legal and safe* abortions. After numerous threats to Dr. Livingston from O.R., he withdrew his support of the lawsuit. Barry offered to represent our chapter as the plaintiff in a legal fight to protect women's rights to control their own bodies and we accepted.

Our case took years, but we won under the RICO racketeering laws and this prevented blockades throughout the nation.

Barry was a role model for others. He was a legal and moral advocate for the environment, animal rights, gun safety, religious freedom, and a consumer champion as a public interest attorney. He served as a state legislator and really shook up Tallahassee. He was the only rabbi to ever serve in the Florida House of Representatives.

Barry became an activist early on, learning from his outstanding parents, Rabbi Sam Silver and Elaine Silver. Barry was an alumnus of FAU and Nova University Law School.

Recently, in June of 2022, he filed a lawsuit against a new Florida law that banned abortions after 15 weeks, on the grounds that the law infringed on our constitutional right to freedom of religion as well as the right to privacy.

He has led congregation L'Dor Va-Dor in Palm Beach County since 1996. The temple's name translates from Hebrew to "Generation to Generation." He was also a songwriter and social activist rabbi-rouser.

He practiced Cosmic Judaism, which merges Judaism and science with ecumenical outreach. Rabbi Barry's book about Cosmic Judaism was published just before his death on March 21, 2024.

More than 20 men who are members of his temple joined our chapter because we are for human rights. We refer to them as "Barry's Brigade" in the future.

My Friend, Barry Silver

I lost a dear friend to cancer this week. His name was Barry Silver. He was a Rabbi, a lawyer, a social justice advocate, a musician, and a strong family man.

Barry had so much going on at one time I was sure that he was triplets. Actually he had several fundamental roles that he fulfilled with dozens of cameo parts to be played along the way.

One starring role was as a lifelong political activist. When he obtained his law degree he began to use his credentials to bring legal actions to protect the environment, fight censorship, and take on many social justice issues. As Barry Silver, Esq. he even took his quarrels with injustice into the Florida Legislature after being elected for a single term in 1996. His takeaway from that experience reinforced his independent nature, teaching him he could do more good working outside the system than within.

In his mantle as religious leader, "Rabbi Barry" was heartily loved by those who understood his struggle to help people liberate their minds from the superstitions and misinformation handed down by their uninformed ancestors and to use more evidence -based information to create a more rational decanter in which to age the fine wine of religion.

Barry pleaded his case by suggesting that organized religion stop regarding their "good book" as divinely authored by their very own god whom they regarded as infallible. Those who took that advice were liberated to develop more independent thinking. Many who didn't understand his meaning felt uncomfortable and some even hated the challenge Rabbi Barry laid at their feet.

Following in the footsteps of his father, Rabbi Sam Silver, he created Cosmic Judaism, which synthesizes religion and science and employs that synthesis to ally the ethics and spirituality of religion with evidence-based knowledge to make the two disciplines more relevant and synergistic. It incorporates the ideas of great thinkers like Darwin, Einstein, Sagan, and Hawking. Barry calls on us to use our minds to support our beliefs with the indisputable knowledge we've gained in the last 5000 years.

In a beautiful coincidence, Barry's book, "Cosmic Judaism" was published and delivered to Barry the

day he passed. That will be his legacy and he held it in his hands before he left us. Judy and I held those hands as he lay dying, his energy gone. He was still aware and responded with hand squeezes and an occasional love, ever holding Judy's eyes his with silent approval. His fight was spent and he was submitting to his fate with peaceful acceptance.

Barry was lucky to have come from a loving family. His mother, Elaine was an accomplished musician and the family rock. His father, Sam, was a forward-thinking rabbi and a loving and concerned human being. He was a huge influence on Barry and planted the seeds of Cosmic Judaism.

Barry's third role was as family man, and he played it as fiercely as he did his others. Francine was the family's rock, the nucleus of the family who held down the fort while Barry was bettering the world.

Barry always made time for his kids and respected their interests and their choices. Both boys were sports oriented - Brandon leaned to basketball and Ari "The Lion" had a talent for tennis. Both boys have exceptional intellects that shone throughout their studies. Barry gave each his loving attention coaching Brandon's basketball team and playing tennis with Ari; he even pawned Ari off on me for weekly tennis games and chats. The competition helped the boy's ego (I always lost), and we spent

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plenty of time talking about our common passion of social justice. These two young men are building their futures with their achievements inside and outside the classrooms.

On a personal level, our relationship goes back about 15 years. We have similar goals and souls so there was much to encourage it to advance down the road from acquaintances to friends. Needless to say, with two strong personalities there were a few speed bumps in the road. By virtue of our common bond we talked often and regularly over the decade and a half of our relationship. We mellowed over the last few years, and almost never did a week pass without our talking at least once.

Barry died way too early, removed by the manager from this playing field at the height of his game nd with too many innings left unplayed.

I recall his creativity and love of music and his musical messages. I recall sitting in a mosque with him at a time when Trump was verbally attacking Muslims and the mosque had been physically damaged.
