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Juneteenth 2025 Michael K. Cantwell

President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation on September 22, 1862. with an effective date of January 1, 1863. Enslaved Texans would not learn of their liberation for nearly two and a half more years, on June 19, 1865, when General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas. His soldiers circulated through town reading an order informing the populace that henceforth there would exist "an absolute equality of personal rights and rights of property between former masters and slaves." Now, 260 years later, descendants of the formerly enslaved are still waiting.

We may not hold the majority, but we have something just as powerful: a vision rooted in fairness, in justice, in equality, and in care.

"Trump Always Chickens Out." **Take tariffs**. He's announced, delayed, doubled, and lowered them, and then delayed them again.

I'm surprised that he didn't add, "Not a lot of people know that," his standard line whenever he learns something that most people already DO know.

And what he's been told about immigrants working in agriculture and hospitality is true of ALL immigrants. The only people who don't know that are the world-class haters.



The Unrealized Promise of "Absolute Equality"

Since 1865, there have been brief periods when absolute equality seemed to be on the horizon, only to be brutally squashed.

The first such period was the Reconstruction Era that followed ratification of the Civil War Amendments: the Thirteenth Amendment formally ended slavery; the Fourteenth Amendment granted citizenship rights and equal protection of the law to anyone born in the United States (that's the one that Donald Trump says doesn't say what it says); and the Fifteenth Amendment prohibited the states from denying or abridging the right of US citizens to vote "based on race, color, or past servitude." It took over 60 years for the Court to rule that "separate but equal" is unconstitutional as applied to education. Even then, *Brown v. Board of Education* did not explicitly overrule *Plessy*, as it ignored segregation in other contexts.

And *Brown* had only limited impact on school segregation because towns across the South created inexpensive private schools to keep Whites from having to attend integrated schools. According to a 2020 study by the National Center for Education Statistics' National Assessment of Educational Progress, Black children are "five times as likely as white children to attend schools that are highly segregated by race and ethnicity" and more than twice as likely to attend "high-poverty schools."

"Juneteenth has never been a celebration of victory, or an acceptance of the way things are. Instead, it's a celebration of progress. It's an affirmation that despite the most painful parts of our history, things do get better. America can change." Barack Ohama, 44th President of the United States.

Formerly enslaved people were elected to local, state, and national offices, At one point, 15% of the office holders in the South were Black, a higher percentage than in 1990. The backlash was swift and sustained, launching a century of terrorism and oppression.

Paramilitary groups of heavily armed Civil War veterans attacked Republican officeholders and suppressed the Black vote through violence and intimidation. Democrats ran nakedly racist races, winning elections by framing the choice as between "white supremacy' or 'Negro rule.""

After federal troops left the South, the losers of the Civil War regained control of their legislatures. They passed a series of "Jim Crow" laws that enforced segregation and amended their Constitutions to "legally" disenfranchise Blacks.

And they rebranded, creating and perpetuating the lie that the Civil War was about "States' Rights." The only "States' Right" at issue was the right to own another and persecute another human being,

In 1896, in one of the most shameful decisions in its history, Plessy v. Ferguson, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the constitutionality of segregation, provided that the separate facilities were "equal" in quality. Anyone with eyes could see they not. It was another decade before Congress dismantled de jure segregation by passing the Civil Rights Acts of 1964 and 1968 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965. De facto segregation is still alive and sick.

Reaction to these laws led directly to Nixon's election, Reagan Democrats, Northern racism (exposed only when integration threatened their de facto segregation.

Barack Obama

The final era of dashed hopes began with the election of Barack Obama and the ludicrous claim that we had become a "colorblind" society. What actually happened was that the election unleashed an unapologetic racism not expressed since the heyday of Bull Connor and George Wallace.

President Obama may have been right when he said "things do get better," but that was before things became a whole lot worse as Donald Trump was elected (and re-elected!).

So we celebrate Juncteenth with the same mixture of jubilation and solemnity that attended the earliest celebration. We will know that we have arrived at "absolute equality" only when, as Bob Marley sang, "The color of a man's skin is of no greater significance than the color of his eyes."

When Will We Ever Learn? Michael K. Cantwell

I was too young to vote in 1968 but I fear I might have been foolish enough to stay home in any case. Nixon was a dog-whistle racist and Wallace was a flat-out racist and Humphrey was the lead author of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and had been a liberal icon for decades. What would seem to have been a simple choice was muddied by Humphrey's support of the Vietnam conflict when he became Johnson's Vice President.

I turned 21 in 1972, and never have I been more certain of my vote than when I cast my ballot for George McGovern, the most decent and progressive candidate nominated for the presidency in my lifetime.

In 1980, however, I was equally certain, this time that Jimmy Carter was too conservative to earn my vote, so I wasted it by voting for the fourth-party candidate, environmentalist Barry Commoner, helping in a small way to elect Ronald Reagan.

I learned. In 2000, I voted for Al Gore, even though my politics were far more closely aligned with Ralph Nader. I was living in New York, so I had a "free vote" – a vote for Nader would not have prevented Gore from winning the state, but I was furious that Nader stayed in the race even after it became clear it would be a nail-biter.

There are many reasons Trump won in 2016 and 2024 (not the least of which was sexism, which is as American as apple pie), but a big one was the fact that many Democrats did not understand that <u>there is no such thing as not voting</u>. "You either vote by voting, or you vote by staying home and tacitly doubling the value of some Diehard's vote," as <u>David Foster Wallace</u> explained.

"If you don't vote, you don't count." Vernon Dahmer Sr., president of the Mississippi NAACP, murdered by the Ku Klux Klan on January 10, 1968

Here's the fallout from the losses in 1968, 1980, 2000, 2016, and 2024. And remember, that with the exception of 1980, these were extremely close races.

Despite being in office only six years before he resigned in disgrace, Richard Nixon appointed four Supreme Court justices and Gerald Ford, appointed to serve out the remainer of Nixon's second terms, successor appointed one more. This flipped the liberal Warren Court (many of whose justices had been appointed by Dwight Eisenhower, at a time when Republican presidents made appointments base of competence rather than politics).

Ronald Reagan appointed three more Supreme Court justices, each of whom voted to stop counting votes in Florida in 2000, effectively selecting George W. Bush as president in a nakedly partisan decision that is among the most reviled in Supreme Court history. Bush in turn appointed John Roberts, who wrote the decision gutting the Civil Rights Act, and Samuel Alito, who wrote the decision reversing *Roe*. Imagine if Al Gore had not been prevented from filling the open seats.

Trump's three appointees provided a majority for the opinion on executive privilege that elected Donald Trump a second time.

All told, since 1968, Republicans have appointed 15 of the last 20 Supreme Court justices, while Democrats have appointed only five (two by Clinton, two by Obama, and one by Biden).

Let us hope that the Democrats who stayed home in 2024 have learned something, and let us further hope that we continue to have elections in which they can put those lessons to use.

Kevin Cooper, chair of the Miami-Dade Republican Party recently ventured north to publish a taunting op-ed in <u>The Sun Sentinel</u>. He claims that Republicans flipped Miami-Dade and intimates they'll flip Palm Beach because:

This is another masterpiece of Republican messaging. It pushes all the emotional buttons while standing the facts on their heads. It talks the talk while Democrats walk the walk. Let's unpack it and see how.

Want safer communities? Vote Blue. Both of Florida's Republican Senators voted against the bipartisan Gun Safety Bill, and only one Republican House Member voted in favor. Democrats are protecting your community. Republican are protecting gun manufacturers.

Want stronger borders? Vote Blue. Republican Senators overwhelmingly supported the bipartisan immigration bill written by very conservative Republican James Lankford, which would have strengthened border security and closed the door on citizenship for undocumented immigrants . . . until Donald Trump told them to vote against it in order to preserve a campaign issue. All but four Republicans obeyed.

Want a "thriving economy"? Vote Blue. The last four Democratic presidents created more than three times as many jobs as the last four Republicans in the same number of months. The economy has performed far better under virtually every economic indicator when a Democrat is in the White House. Even Donald Trump once admitted as much.

Want quality education? Vote Blue. Republican politicians in Tallahassee are dictating what teachers must teach. That's not just "government overreach." It's what totalitarian regimes do.

Want leaders who stand up to dictators and tyrants? Vote Blue. Republicans look the other way when Trump cozies up to Vladmir Putin, Kim Jong Un, and Mohammed bin Salman.

And they shrug their shoulders every time Trump flouts the Constitution, threatens judges, and abrogates the independence of the Department of Justice.

A Century of Republican Incompetence and Racism Versus Democratic Competence and Inclusion

Republicans Cause the Great Depression Democrats Create the Safety Net

1923-1932: Republicans control Congress and the White House as the country careens into the Great Depression. The government does nothing to alleviate suffering as unemployment reaches 25% and millions become homeless.

1933-1944: FDR's "New Deal" for America includes a massive public works program, a "safety net" for desperate Americans, and regulation of the economic titans who caused the Great Depression. In his final State of the Union FDR proposes a Second Bill of Rights:

We cannot be content, no matter how high that general standard of living may be, if some fraction of our people—whether it be one-third or one-fifth or one-tenth—is ill-fed, ill-clothed, ill-housed, and insecure.

The dream dies with FDR two months later.

Democrats Expand the Safety Net Republicans Resort to Red-Baiting and Racism

1964: Democrats pass Medicare and Medicaid. Shilling for the AMA, Ronald Reagan calls it socialized medicine and warns that if Medicare passes, "you and I are going to spend our sunset years telling our children, and our children's children, what it once was like in America when men were free."

1964-1965: Democrats pass the Civil Rights and Voting Rights Acts. LBJ warns "we have lost the South for a generation." It is a gross underestimate.

1968: Richard Nixon launches his "Southern Strategy," using racist dog whistles to capture the presidency.

1981-1992: With an appeal to "States Rights," Reagan opens his campaign in the Mississippi county where the Klan murdered Goodman, Schwerner, and Chaney, His presidency is marked by racist tropes ("welfare queens driving Cadillacs" and "strapping young bucks buying T-bone steaks with Food Stamps"). George H.W. Bush follows suit with Willie Horton. The Solid South flips, the Raw Deal replaces the New Deal, and the federal debt quadruples.

1993-2001: Bill Clinton creates 23 million jobs during his tenure. The annual budget shows a surplus for his last three years in office. The Supreme Court stops the vote count and hands the presidency to George W. Bush. Al Gore concedes rather than foment an insurrection.

Republicans Continue Creating Messes Democrats Continue Fixing Them

2001-2008: George W. Bush ignores CIA warnings regarding Osama bin Laden, leading to 9/11. He invades Afghanistan and corners but then loses bin Laden in the mountains. He launches a \$3-trillion war against Iraq based on lies and in violation of international law. He spies on Americans unlawfully. He doubles the federal debt.

Bush signs tax cuts benefitting the wealthiest Americans. He tries but fails to privatize Social Security. He bungles the response to Katrina. He lets banksters run wild and they cause the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression. Four million Americans lose their jobs and 10 million (disproportionately POC) lose their homes.

2009-2016: The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 prevents a second Great Depression and Obama adds a net of 11 million jobs. Democrats pass the Affordable Care Act, insuring 20 million previously uninsured Americans and saving tens of thousands of lives. Bin Laden is killed.

2016-2020, Behold the Beast: Dismissed as a joke by a craven, clueless corporate media, Donald Trump presides over the most ruinous presidency in American history. His single legislative achievement is a tax cut for plutocrats and multinationals. Inheriting the longest postwar expansion, he adds nearly as much debt in 4 years as Obama added in 8. His incompetent response to COVID exacerbates the death toll and plunges the country into a Second Great Depression. He loses 9.3 million jobs in his final year, becoming the first president to preside over a net job loss during his tenure.

2021-24, A Consequential Presidency: Democrats pass the American Recovery Plan and Inflation Reduction Act without any Republican votes. Biden signs the largest infrastructure bill in decades, the first gun safety legislation in nearly three decades, the biggest expansion of veterans' benefits in over three decades, and an investment in microchip production to make America more competitive with China.

Biden adds over 16 million jobs (more than any president in a single term) and unemployment flirts with its lowest rate in 54 years, tames the COVID-created inflation, and turns over a strong economy to Donald Trump

2025-?: Trump begins to make good on his second chance to destroy the economy and his first real chance to destroy the Republic.
