The damage that Trump can accomplish in a second term is incalculable. This time he will be supported by <u>Project 2025</u>, a coalition led by the extreme right-wing Heritage Foundation.

Project 2025's goal is to "take back our government," although "take over" is a more accurate description. Project 2025 Director Paul Dans <u>brags</u>, "We are not tinkering at the edges. We are writing a battle plan, and we are marshaling our forces."

Just as the Federalist Society provided Trump with a list of rightwing judicial activists to set the justice system back a century, Project 2025 has assembled a list of some 20,000 apparatchiks to staff a second Trump administration.

We are already reeling from a takeover of the Supreme Court by troglodytes. It's unlikely our democracy or our planet could survive the establishment of an imperial presidency.

Project 2025 proposes to:

- Slash funding to the Department of Justice
- Dismantle the FBI and the Homeland Security
- Deploy the military for domestic enforcement
- Restrict access to abortion
- Infuse government with Christian nationalism
- Abolish the Department of Education, the Notice of Allowance, and the Commerce Department
