Thanks to Scott Maxwell for calling out book banners who never read the books ("Flori-duh: 'Florida school board bans book about book bans," June 16). But I doubt that even reading would make much difference, since their arguments show they simply don't understand literature. Passages about sex and gender identity make them clutch their pearls, but so do racism, immigrants' struggles — anything that portrays "the other" as worthy of respect.

Many are not acting as parents, but as political operatives.

The evidence of their extremism is the call to remove Mark Twain's "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn." Huck's only "thirteen or fourteen," on his own, but informed by the white slave society he ran from. He's befriended Jim, a runaway slave who has been like a father to him. When authorities near Jim's hiding place, Huck

must choose whether to expose him; he's been taught that not doing so is a grave sin. Then this child makes one of the greatest moral decisions in American literature: "All right, then, I'll go to hell."

In our political climate of cowardice and malleable morality, young people need such literature

Florida students are graduating with gaping holes in their literacy. Suppression of important books is educational malpractice. It removes the tools that develop learning's most important goal: critical thinking.
